

# LinkedIn New Features and Changes (Nov 22 - Dec 05, '24)

#### Multi-image, scrolling profile banners

We can now add up to 5 images to our profile banners or cover image. These continuously scroll at 3 second intervals. This feature uses the same interface we see on posts when adding images.

### Report history


There is a new option in Settings & Privacy allowing you to review your prior reports. This may be a regional or country requirement to provide members access to what they have reported as it doesn't seem to be available in New Zealand.

Allowing you to edit before submitting, this is based on Market Value Filter Job titles and includes the most sought-after skills, pay disclosure, screening questions, automatic filtering and rejection messaging.


## Update to Notifications

In behind the three-dot More menu alongside each notification is 'Change notification preferences'. This has been updated to a customised toggle option related to the type of notification you've clicked on.

#### 4 new additions to Featured from profile sections

When LinkedIn added the ability to include sections of our profiles to Featured, there were 4 options: Experience, Courses, Licences and Certifications, and Recommendations. Now 4 more have been added: Education, Projects, Skills, and Honors and awards. Each of these allows us to add an individual role, recommendation, award, skill, project etc. For example, if you have a particular project in your Projects section you want to highlight, you can now add it to your Featured section – providing you have Premium. While all this is a great step forward, what's not so great is the way these display. Given that Featured is all about visuals, this runs counter to that.
